At the conclusion of the official speeches, we then marched around our school grounds to show solidarity for the cause and to come together as one community with a desire to enact change.

Where did this start?

The Climate Strike is a series of international strikes and protests to demand action to be taken to address Climate Change.



In August, 2018, a girl named Greta Thunburg began protesting in front of the Swedish Parliament, rather than attending School. She chose to demand action to be taken on Climate Change. Her actions soon sparked a movement and led young people from all across the World to start to "strike from school" and to demand action.

Why is Global Warming a problem?

Global warming is causing sea levels to rise in two ways.

First, glaciers and ice sheets worldwide are melting, and this is adding water to the ocean.

Second, the volume of the ocean is expanding as the water warms and this is also causing our sea levels to rise.

A study in 2019 predicated that by 2050 the sea level will rise by 30 centimetres if we don't help to stop it. This will mean that many small islands could be under water by 2050 due to climate change.

What is the Marine Impact?

Global warming is changing the temperature of the oceanand it's getting hot.

Changes in water temperature can affect the environments where fish, shellfish, and other marine species live. Some marine animals may adapt by moving towards cooler areas.

Warmer sea temperatures are causing coral bleaching which impacts on the coral reef ecosystem that are home to many of the food sources for other animals.

Warmer sea temperatures are directly impacting on the development and growth of most fish and the causing fewer fish to be in the ocean.

LITTLE PENGUINS

Last Friday's dramatic play centred on the 'Bruny Island District School Supermarket – Little Penguins'. Fresh mandarins, apples from our very own orchard, white seedless grapes from Salamanca Fresh, adorned our shelves. Other produce included dry biscuits (chosen intentionally for their shapes), and lunch delicacies. The check-out corner was sometimes managed by Maya, Julian or Nia. Without any instructions or directions from adults the 'shoppers' lined up for their daily and weekly shopping. Brown paper bags carried their produce instead of plastic bags. Children are very familiar with the behaviours expected in supermarkets and this was made evident in the dramatic play.



Shop will form the core

of the dramatic play. To enrich the experience, students will be donning on their aprons and 'baker's hats' to make some of their own cookies to add to the shelves. Every week we do some baking and children enjoy it immensely. Scones and pizzas are all products the children have made – all popular – as was the Apple Crumble.

As the age group of our children varies, we introduced the idea of 'edible' necklace making last Friday too. Real beads can be hazardous with little ones in the space, whose first experiment with curious objects is to taste and put straight into the mouth, and we are highly cognizant of this fact. However, threading breakfast cereal onto wool to create a necklace provided excellent scope for young fingers to develop their fine motor coordination skills.

Some things stay pretty much the same each week. They are finite, like the construction corner. The Art table is always in the same place. It too, is finite. Children need this stability and repetition to be able to build on what they know. They need to be able to revisit their explorations and adventures. 'Pete the Cat' or 'No, David' are stories that will be repeated so language patterns become familiar.

At the same time, children need new stimulation and a sense of 'things' including change. This is why we introduce new materials and contexts – to fire their imagination and spur their curiosity.

INDONESIAN ACROSS THE CLASSROOMS

On Monday Bu Ingrid once again visited our school in her role as the Bahasa Indonesian Specialist Teacher.

She worked with all students from Kindergarten to Grade Six. She had an extended time in the K/P/1 Class which gave her an opportunity to connect with our youngest students. Throughout their morning routines Bu Ingrid made natural links between English and Bahasa Indonesian during morning sharing time, news, fruit break and play time using authentic learning opportunities.

Ingrid's focus with all classes this year was centred around the 2021 Dark MOFO Ogoh-ogoh parade which is the final event for the Winter solstice parade and burning.

This is a Balinese inspired tradition which occurs on the Balinese New Year's Eve. The following day is Nyepi Day which is traditionally a Day of Silence in preparation for the start of the year ahead.

This year the Ogoh-ogoh is the Mount Mangana Stag Beetle. The Balinese artists who have created the designs of endemic Tasmanian species for the festivals over the past years can't be here so they have created the frame for the beetle out of bamboo as well as a number of smaller bamboo insects for our students to decorate. These will form the 'swarm' for the mini procession.




Students will decorate the insects which were shipped from Bali, and have them ready for the Winter Solstice Parade.

The University of Tasmania have collaborated with the SHORTS DAY artists from Bali and

This year's Dark Mofo, Balinese inspired, Ogoh -ogoh is the Mt Mangana Stag Beetle. To celebrate the Bruny connection,



the Balinese artists have made framed bamboo insects for the children to decorate.

Children are invited to attend the winter solstice burning on Sunday June 20th and carry their insects as part of a 'swarm

in the mini procession beforehand. Numbers for the general public are limited but children with insects (with their families) are guaranteed a spot.


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SINGER, SONGWRITER, PERFORMER
