#### SAVING OUR ENVIRONMENT

After the climate strike march on May 21st, the Dolphins class have been digging deep about what "SAVE OUR ENVIRONMENT" really means and how we, as a class, can do this. We had lots of suggestions and some great discussions.



MARIN ''Don't throw rubbish away or it will end up in the ground".

MORGAN "Each little thing makes a big thing"

We asked Bob to leave the rubbish bins in the classroom for a couple of days and then we took a look at what we throw away to landfill. We noticed almost all our garbage is

paper and avoidable - either paper towels after washing our hands, or waste paper that can be recycled. We already have a worm farm on our deck in which we put all our fruit scraps, so there is no food waste in our bin.



As a class we have decided to use cloth towels as much as possible and we now have a classroom paper recycle bin in which we throw any paper that has been used on both sides. We are planning to use that paper to make more paper next term. We also noticed that the bins are all lined with plastic bin liners

and these liners are thrown away with the rubbish each day. After reflecting on this point, Liz spoke with Bob to suggest that the bins didn't need to be emptied each day and she was told that Laney and Morgan had already approached him and asked him to stop using bin liners at all. Well done Laney and Morgan!

The Preps and Year I's had a look at what we can do outside of school to help reduce our waste when we are out and about and these are the things they came up with:

Henry: Use a cloth bag instead of a plastic bag.

Lola: Use a water bottle, don't buy bottles of water.

Hamish: Bring your own bags for fruit and vegetables.

Laney: We are making the world hotter. We can stop using

cars. We can start using buses and bikes.

Mitch: Don't use disposable cutlery. Take your own to the shop.

Zoe: Use bees wax wraps instead of plastic.

Oliver: Use metal or wooden cutlery, not plastic.

Tilly: A keep cup is useful for take away coffee.
