

PARENT- TEACHER CONVERSATIONS


Recently we invited all families to make an appointment using an online booking system.

SHORTS DAY

GREETINGS FROM NURSE KATHERINE



Brave the Cold, Brave the Conversation is the motto for the annual Speak Up! Stay Chatty Shorts Day event. For the second year in a row, we invited staff and students to come to school dressed in brightly coloured shorts (and socks) and brave the cold to encourage awareness of mental health.

As a school, we came together to discuss what it means to be brave, demonstrate our value of Courage and have conversations with a trusted adult if you are worried. We also talked about the importance of being a good friend and checking in with your mates.

We read the book *The Problem with Problems* and discussed the theme of this book– that a problem's biggest weakness is being shared with someone else.

June 20 - 26th is World Continence Awareness Week

Children usually develop the ability to be toilet trained at about 3 years of age. If children aged 4 years and over are unable to be toilet trained, or experience regular incontinence, advice from a health professional is recommended.

The bladder is the organ that stores urine (wee). In Australia, I in 5 children have a bladder control problem.

Signs of a healthy bladder:

Empties 4-6 times a day; can hold up to 400-600ml of urine; may wake you up once at night to pass urine, tells you when it is full but gives you enough time to find a toilet; empties completely each time you pass urine; does not leak urine. **Types of incontinence in children:**

<u>Daytime Wetting</u> - the loss of bladder control during the day, usually caused because the bladder is not working properly. It is NOT caused by attention-seeking, naughtiness, or laziness.

<u>Bedwetting</u> - this happens when the bladder involuntarily empties during the night. Most children will be dry at night by school age. Some children may experience accidents until 7 or 8 years.

It is important to seek professional help for bedwetting if:

- your child starts wetting at night after being dry
- the wetting is frequent after school age
- the wetting bothers the child or makes them upset
- the child wants to become dry.

<u>Soiling</u> -is when the bowels are emptied in places other than the toilet. It usually happens because the large bowel is not emptying properly, and the child is constipated.

EVERY DAY COUNTS

Getting kids to school isn't always easy. But being at school is the best place for our kids.

If your child is unwell, they need to stay home. But if your child is well enough to attend school, they *should* be at school. Every day, Monday to Friday.

Reality of missing school

Data shows us that regular school attendance is one of the best things a child can do to set them up for success. But if they don't attend, things get harder for them.

Let's do the maths:

• If your child misses even just one day a fortnight, that adds up to 20 days of the school year. That's the same as missing four whole weeks of school!

• If they miss one day a week, that doubles to eight weeks of school they'll never get back.

Over the course of their childhood, that equals two and a half years of vital education they'll never receive... We mean it, every school day counts. It all adds up.

Bright futures begin at school

The data also tells us something else: the better a child's attendance rate, the better off they'll be. Their future will be filled with more opportunities.

School is where they learn and grow alongside their friends, and where they benefit the most. Going to school not only promotes academic success, but also helps build important social skills, relationships and confidence.

Good attendance habits in primary school lead to good attendance habits in high school. This will help expand your child's options even further as they grow older.
