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BUSY BEES IN K-P-I

The K-P-I Inquiry, "What is Spring?" started as we spotted the first blossoms appearing on the trees in our school yard. Children were invited to notice changes in the environment by taking photos on the IPads. A recurring theme arose requiring further investigation: the role of bees in our world. Further questions and wonderings led the students to become researchers, desperate to find out more.

A multi-faceted approach led to some wonderful discoveries in the *Dolphins* classroom where we spent the last part of Term 3 exploring the topic of bees. Students made models, drew scientific labelled drawings, were visited by 'expert beekeeper' Oliver Spooner, read fiction and nonfiction books together, watched informative bee videos, wrote about bees and even ate the glorious offerings of bees in our end of term cooking.



Our busy bees soaked up the new learning like warm toast soaks up honey! Here are some interesting bee facts we discovered:

- Bees communicate via waggle dances and each routine communicates a different location to find nectar or pollen.
- It takes up to 12 worker bees a whole lifetime to produce just one teaspoon of honey, so don't waste it.
- Worker bees (females) do all the hard work; collecting pollen and nectar, building honeycomb, making honey, feeding babies.
- The drones (male bees) only job is to mate with the Queen after which they die!
- Bees have two stomachs, one for nectar and one for waste. They make honey by repeatedly vomiting the





nectar, passing it from bee to bee until all of the water is removed and honey is made and stored away in the honeycomb.

• Honey can last forever without going bad if stored correctly (honey was found in the tomb of an Egyptian

mummy and was still good enough to eat, 3000 years later!)

- A Queen bee is made not born (when a new Queen is needed the workers will feed baby bees a special potion called Royal Jelly which will turn the bee into royalty).
- Bees are responsible for the pollination of around 1/3 of all of the world's food, so if we don't look after them our food crops are in trouble.

Bees need our protection; please look after our bees!













EARLY YEARS PLAYGROUND REDEVELOPMENT

We had an ambitious goal to build the first Early Years playground on Bruny Island.

We invited the community to help us achieve this ambitious goal and together, as a community, we raised the \$40,000 we needed for this project.



With thanks to the many generous businesses, families and individuals that donated during our 2021 fundraising appeal, we have now almost completed our beautiful, new Early Years Playground for children aged between birth and 5 years of age.

Stage I and 2 are now complete with plans for Stage 3 to commence shortly.

Stage 1: *Earthworm* to establish and upgrade the playground space.

Stage 2: Plants and seating.

Stage 3: A beautiful and practical new shelter for families.

We will be inviting our fundraising champions to a very special official opening of our new playground before the end of the year; once all stages are complete.

This final stretch of the school year can sometimes be challenging to get your kids to school. But being at school is the best place for our kids, and it's important we make every school day count.

If you're struggling to get your child to school, help is available. Please talk to us at school about your situation. We'll support you, in whatever way we can.

Here are some tips to help:

- Create a routine.
- Give yourself enough time in the morning.
- Be on time, every day. Monday to Friday.
- Schedule appointments and trips outside of school hours.
- Get a good night's sleep.
- Set some technology boundaries.

If your child is well enough to attend school, they should be at school. Every day, Monday to Friday.

Data tells us that the better a child's attendance rate, the better off they'll be. Their future will be filled with *more opportunities*.... which is what every parent and carer wants for their child.



School is where they learn and grow alongside their friends, and where they benefit the most.

Going to school not only promotes academic success, but also helps build important social skills, relationships and confidence.



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GET ONLINE WEEK: INTERGENERATIONAL LEARNING




Get Online Week is taking place from 17 -23 October. This is an opportunity for people most at risk of digital exclusion, such as older people, people with disabil-
