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WHAT LASTS?

To support our current inquiry of learning into the concept of *permanency*, we have been granted an opportunity to attend **putalina** as a whole school excursion next Monday.

putalina is a site that has ongoing and longstanding significance to the Aboriginal community of Tasmania. It is a landscape rich in the evidence of occupation by Aboriginal people over thousands of years. We can see evidence of quarries where stone tools were created, the middens where people ate their meals, and the plant life that sustained the people and nurtured the birds and animals. This is a site that has seen some of the most important cultural and historical events of the last 170 + years for the Aboriginal community.

The site was returned *formally* to the Aboriginal community through the *Aboriginal Lands Act 1995* with the title held by the Aboriginal Land Council of Tasmania, and managed by the Tasmanian Aboriginal Centre on behalf of the Aboriginal community.



We are visiting this site to further explore our current inquiry into the question of *What lasts*? We will explore the concept of *permanency* and consider what has lasted throughout time. This shared experience will be guided by a member of the Aboriginal community and with our Aboriginal Education Worker Hayley.

Here are the details of the excursion:

Students will need:

- School uniform
- Drink bottle of water
- Packed recess and lunch
- Suitable outdoor shoes
- A coat (or something warm) to keep warm

Please note: this excursion is weather dependent. If it is wet or windy, we will need to postpone this excursion.

In preparation for this excursion, Hayley has been guiding us to be learning as researchers and consider *what has lasted* from the perspective of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people. We have a lot to explore and learn about the concept of *permanency* though this important cultural lens.








KATH MURDOCH





What is Inquiry Learning? Kath Murdoch explains:

Inquiry refers not only to the nature of the learning but also to the disposition of the teacher. Teachers who work this way see the learner as an active participant in the learning process. Inquiry learning is an approach that demands high-order thinking. The student is continually

challenged by the teacher, and tasks are designed to prompt students to question, predict, gather, analyse, synthesise and reflect. The Power Of Inquiry by Kath Murdoch, p. 14/15.

Teaching and learning with curiosity, creativity and purpose are not new to the way we approach teaching and learning at Bruny Island District School. We have been inspired by the work of Kath Murdoch who is an educational consultant based in Melbourne, and who works with schools and education providers across the globe.

As a staff, we have been unpacking the key teaching pedagogies and practices of this approach to teaching and learning and recently, we become part of an *Inquiry Collective* which is a group of schools across southern Tasmania who are working towards improving their skills in this area.


The Inquiry Collective consists of the following schools:

WELCOME IBU NOVI



This week we are hosting Ibu Novi from our partnership school in Bandung, West Java.

Novi is the new exchange teacher from SDN 164 Karangpawulang, a primary school of approximately 1000 students, an enormous contrast to our school.

This exchange program is part of the Bridge Indonesian Project, where schools in Indonesia are partnered with schools across Australia. We have been involved in this program since 2014. Our school has hosted teachers from Indonesia. Principals and teachers have visited and worked alongside teachers in our partnership school. Miss Shelton is the new partnership teacher for our school. Ibu Novi is interested in learning about differentiated learning and Inquiry teaching. During her stay she is also teaching the students how to make Indonesian sweets called Kelepon, an activity which is like Batik making known as Batik Jumputan as well as some traditional Indonesian songs.

This week in our assembly students were invited to ask a question about Indonesia and share a fact about our school, or Bruny Island. Throughout the week students will be adding to this Inquiry. Ibu Novi will answer questions and take the statements back to her students in Indonesia.

We have begun another week of rich learning with a focus on intercultural understanding.
