BRUNY ISLAND EXCURSION REPORT - 1/2/3 CLASS

The 1/2/3 class were exceptional on the excursion which toured Bruny Island to view areas of historical significance.. They showed the community our school values and used their inquiry minds to participate and communicate as researchers and collaborators. A special thankyou to Hayley who joined our class for the day to share her knowledge around First Nations history.



Class Report:

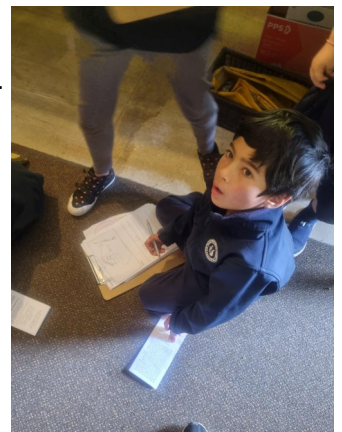
On Monday the 5th of June Bruny Island District School 1/2/3 class went on an excursion. First we went to the Quarantine Station. The Quarantine Station is a place where people would get quarantined after war. They had to stay here for a week. There are buildings, one is a mortuary, one is a plant room, and one is a cleansing room. The class went in five at a time to the mortuary, in there was a table, a cupboard, a cabinet with tools they used to examine people after they died, and a bath for cleaning them, The cleansing room had a small bag that you put your clothes in and they would put the bag in a tub for an hour. Then next room had a display of what the doctors wore.



Next the class went to The Neck. The Neck has a monument for Truganini and looks out over the place where her ashes were spread between Bruny Island and the rest of Tasmania. Hayley talked about how Truganini was buried in the female factory and was found there one hundred and fifty years later, and then moved to the museum for another one hundred years! The government then decided to spread her ashes along the channel, we got back on the bus and took off for Coal Point.

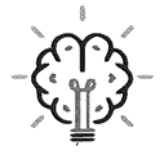
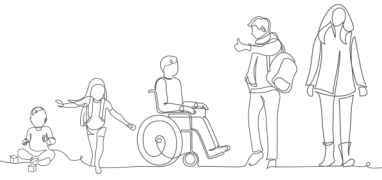
Coal Point is a place to gather items such as abalone shells, crayfish and bull kelp that's washed onto the rocks, it is also a good spot for fishing and diving. Hayley spoke about how the First Nations people created water carriers from the bull kelp and that this was a living site (A place First Nations People would often cook and be together). We spoke about the perspective from the First Nations People watching the boats arrive in Adventure Bay from this spot and reflected on how they would have felt during this time. I bet they were very scared.

Finally, we went to Bligh's Museum. Barry, the museum keeper, told us some very interesting facts! We learnt that Captain Cooks wife was named Elizabeth Cook. In the museum I saw the tree that Captain Cook tied to when he first arrived. I thought pf lots of great questions. The items in the museum are very old, older than my mum and dad! They are also very precious. The 1/2/3 class had lots of fun.

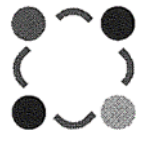

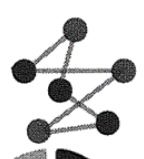

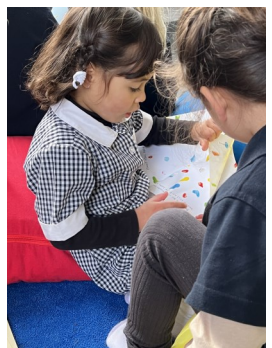

Reading every day is such a crucial part of learning. As a department and as a school we know that reading is the foundational skill that helps with all other areas of learning.

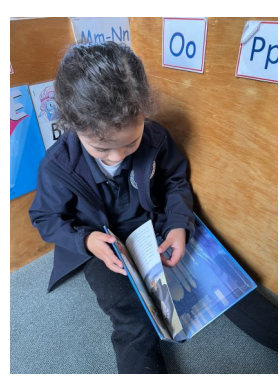


One of our key messages for our parents and carers is the value and importance of children reading at home every single day. This is the most important thing that parents can do to help their children succeed at school. Reading familiar books is a crucial step in learning to read so don't be alarmed if your child wants to read the same book over and over. Even independent readers need the opportunity to read aloud to check on their fluency, pronunciation and expression.

- Enjoy books together, discussing the story and illustrations
- Talk about the book – what do you like, dislike
- Discuss new vocabulary – were there words your child didn't know the meaning of? Talk about what they mean.
- Take turns at reading, especially if your child is reading a more challenging book
- Make sure you read a mixture of fiction and non-fiction books

Have fun reading together!

The bark hut has now been within our playground for a almost a week and it has become a very popular play space for children. We are excited to hear our First Nations students talk to their peers about the process they went through to make the structure and how proud they are of the finished build.

We will continue to host events such as this in the coming months and we look forward to further collaborating with SETAC in the future.

MID-YEAR REPORTS

The 9-point scale shows where your child's learning achievement is against the expected standard for their year level.

There will be no teacher comments in the report.

This term parent/teacher conversations will be offered in Week 10 and 11. These are a great opportunity to discuss how your child is progressing with their learning. We will provide more information and a booking system for the parent/ teacher conversations in the coming weeks.
